






On Friday, Rohan,




Just till Tuesday - less

Vijay out of my mind. How does he feel tied down to a chair, helpless, dependent on someone all the time?










Well, Vijay and Amar

How would you feel if people never mentioned 'accident' or death or 'parents' or' foster care' in front of you. How would you react if people treated you as if you were different from others?












































## Thanks to the ramp that Mr. Saran had fixed, Vijay move easily into the living room.



































In the afternoon they visit the Natural History Museum. They join many other children who look at Vijay with a great deal of curiosity.



























Amar and the driver have picked and carried Vijay and then wheelchair a countless times in two days.


houses can do is to construct places keeping the disabled too in mind.

I consider myself very fortunate. Because my parents are not poor they provide me with all the support I need. My future doesn't seem dark and frightening as it must be for thousands like me.

And even though the government claims that jobs are reserved for the disabled, it is as if a favour is being bestowed on them. They don't need pity. Just a recognition that they are differently abled and a support system which will help them to tap their potential in whichever area they want to.








We want to create awareness in people of our needs and our plight.























The evening of August 15. Lots of children are assembled on Rajpath near the India Gate. Accompanying the disabled are an equal number of abled people.





5-6% of India's population is disabled.

There are over 70 million disabled people in our country.

Less than 1% of children with disability receive education of any kind.

The first Special Employment Exchange for the physically disabled was established in Mumbai in 1959.


In 1977, the Government of India reserved 3% of vacancies in identified jobs in Government and the public sector, in Groups C&D.

Since the setting up of the first Special Employment Exchange, in almost 41 years, only about 1,00,000 disabled persons have been employed!

According to the National Sample Survey of 1991, there are 7 million employable disabled people waiting to get a job. A disabled activist had to file a Public Interest Litigation in the Hon'ble Supreme Court in order to make air travel accessible and disabled-friendly. However, our buses and trains continue to be inaccessible for an average disabled person.

Take a look around and see as to how many of our public buildings are accessible?!!

Let's break down these barriers; let's overcome prejudice; let's join hands - the disabled and the non-disabled; let's not worry about disability or be ashamed of it; let's take a confident step forward, as one people - proud citizens of proud nation.
