abuse of boys continued, supported by member NGOs of National Alliance of Grassroots NGOs in several states of India. The lockdown also witnessed Butterflies' Resilience Centre being converted into a temporary quarantine center for children (girls) recovering from Covid.

I would conclude by sharing with you a drawing made by our children, which they have named it Happiness Chai (tea). They made it during the pandemic, when most children were anxious about the future especially if they will be able to go back to school. Children were also afraid and unhappy listening to news about COVID-19 pandemic, number of cases infected and hospitalised. One of the Buddies came up with a brilliant idea to take their minds off COVID-19. She had conversations with the child members and asked them how about drawing a cup of chai (tea) as that is something all love to sip. The children decided they would draw a 'Happiness Cup of **Chai**". The cup of chai will have ingredients that will make them happy. Each child drew their own happiness chai that had ingredients that make them happy!! This activity really brought in cheer to the children. We really hope that the coming years fills our cups of tea also with things that cheer us, things that give us hope and strength to carry on the work we do with your support.

Introduction

Since 1989, our rights-based, participatory, noninstitutional approach seeks to support children to continue formal education, impart life skills to vulnerable children and adolescents to aspire and reach for their dreams and goals in life. Butterflies has initiated innovative interventions and partnered with various agencies to garner support for these children.

Butterflies is a member of Family for Every Child, a global alliance of local civil society organisations working together to improve the lives of vulnerable children and families around the world.

Butterflies is the Secretariat of the India Alternate Care Network (IACN), supported by UNICEF India.

Within India, the Children's Cooperatives Programme operates in 7 states and 1 Union Territory - Uttarakhand, Kerala, Delhi, Bihar, Jharkhand, Odisha, Rajasthan and Maharashtra.

Street Education Programme

The street education programme is a unique non-institutional approach of empowering street and working children in the city of Delhi in places like bus terminals, railway stations, market places, parks. Through 8 contact points in Delhi (Chandni Chowk, Haathi Park, Kashmiri Gate, INA Market, Sadar Bazar, Jama Masjid, Nizamuddin Dargah, Okhla) it reaches out to almost 1,000 children on a daily basis.

Cooperative Learning during the Pandemic

The Cooperative learning approach in our education program has proven extremely helpful during this pandemic. Children were helping and supporting each other for in the teaching learning process, understanding concepts in groups by sharing questions and doubts. Some children in senior grades also assisted children from junior grades. The field educators were available for children according to their time and circumstances to support the group online where concepts were clarified. The experiences have shown that children are becoming more responsible, sharing their knowledge, resources and are supportive of each other rather than being competitive. Children who have moved to their next grade passed on their old books to the junior grade children in their neighborhood.

The indefinite closure of formal schools and limited access to learning through online mode has severally impacted the learning outcomes of children particularly from those who are from poor socioeconomic backgrounds and do not have adequate resources. In this context, academic and emotional support from our Child Development officers & Child Protection Officers has helped children in our programme to remain in school. They were accessing our offline, face to face education classes, and counselling support at the contact points as well our team members were also available for children to call them anytime they required support or just to talk. Cooperative learning approach has been one of best strategy as the students who have been part of our programme utilized cooperative learning skills during this period.

Children's own Council (Bal Sabhas)

Children's participation is a guiding principle which informs Butterflies' way of working, cutting across all areas of our work with children. Bal sabhas (Children's councils) are important and safe spaces for children to share their concerns, views and collectively seek solutions to their issues. Children from all contact points attend these council meetings, which provide them opportunities to learn democratic values and skills such as active listening, negotiation skills, acceptance of a different viewpoints, decision making with consensus. The agenda, discussion and decisions in these meetings include issues and concerns affecting their lives and society such as water and sanitation, infrastructure, school, and education, violence, safe spaces to play, planning for sports and cultural events, picnics, etc. Majority of the children who participated in these Bal Sabhas shared the issues faced by them during lockdown, challenges to follow online studies and completing assignments and examinations. Some children raised their concerns over not having text books. The discussion in the meetings helped them find solutions to these problems. Information sharing, lesson planning and strengthening cooperatives learning among the members were some of the important solutions.

Sports Day

After a gap of almost 2 years, Butterflies organised a sports event on 19th February 2022. It was a moment of joy and happiness for the children to be back on the playground together physically.

Exposure Visits- Excursion for Children Blends History and Recycling- March 2022 brought Butterflies' first excursion for students since the pandemic. Children from two of its eight contact points were escorted to *"Bharat Darshan Park"* situated at Punjabi Bagh to learn about a range of Indian monuments fashioned with an innovative twist. Using a *"waste to wealth"* model, the Park featured replicas of 22 historical monuments from 14 states, all built from recycled waste and scrap material and showcased in an environment powered by solar energy. *"We cannot visit the whole of India, but this visit brought the whole of India to us"* was the way several of the children characterised the outing.

Outing for Mothers- When the Butterflies' Child Development Officer conducting the monthly meeting at our Chandni Chowk contact point heard mothers lament that they had little leisure time for themselves, the result was an outing organised for a Sunday when their husbands could fill in at home. A local park provided a relaxing venue for games, conviviality, and sharing snacks that the women brought from home. This ladies 'day off', all agreed, was a boon to their emotional well-being.

Assisting Families with Applications for Government Assistance- With the support of local government representative Mr. Devender Tanwar, staff at Butterflies' Okhla Mandi Child Development Centre organised two hands-on camps where migrant family members learned how to gather the documentation to apply for the Aadhar and Voter ID cards required for accessing government benefits.

Nutrition on the go- Packed nutritious snacks are being regularly served to children in eight contact points, five days a week. The children look forward to their snacks and during this hot summer, fruit juices and buttermilk are also part of the kit.

Relief Material Distribution- Butterflies has been distributing dry food ration kits to families and individuals.

Touching Lives

Kashish joined our Jama Masjid Contact point in December 2021. She studies in 9th grade. She was not doing well in formal school and her parents were worried that she would not pass the examination. She is a first generation learner and therefore, teaching- learning support is not available at home. Kashish had difficulties in mathematics and social science subjects. **"Before enrolling at Butterflies contact point, I have always felt difficulty in understanding Mathematics and Social Science".** With initial conversation and assessment, Butterflies' education programme officer at Jama Masjid and the child could identify that while learning mathematics was difficult for her, she did not find civics an interesting subject. Some topics of civics were explained with its relevance to everyday life. For example, how the government officers have to be aware of laws and systems and how it helps them to execute the programmes for the people effectively. Similarly, the importance of knowing mathematics was also explained to her. Initially, simple assignments were given to her so that she could solve them, generate interest and get motivated. Progressively, questions that are more complex were given to her to solve and she was able to do it. This strategy helped to motivate and increase her interest in mathematics. **"When I realized that I could solve some difficult mathematics problems, could give correct answers in front of other children, I felt really happy".**

Kashish lives at Ajmeri Gate, in Jama Masjid which is a 15 minute walk from her place of stay to the Contact Point. She is present at the contact point every day without missing a single education session. She is determined to score better percentage of marks and improve her rank in the class.



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Intervention in Uttarakhand

In Uttarakhand, Butterflies under a Memorandum of Understanding with the Government of Uttarakhand, Samagrah Siksha Abhiyan (programme), identifies and supports out of school children to prepare them to join age appropriate grade in formal schools through the Special Training Programme.

Using multipurpose mobile schools with teaching – learning materials the educators, reaches out to out of school children in urban areas of Dehradun, Haridwar and Udham Singh Nagar to bring them into the education net by providing quality education till the last mile.

Children of migrant families, children dropped out of schools or never enrolled are provided learning support for a year at Non Residential Special Training Centres (NRSTCs) in these districts and mainstreamed in formal schools at age appropriate levels.

The programme contributes significantly to ensure the objectives of the Right to Education in the state of Uttarakhand.

Along with academic teaching learning, children also learn life skills though Bal Sabhas, health sessions and creative activities such as arts and crafts, poetry writing, daily newspaper reading. The mobile schools are well equipped with a laptop, library and play material for children.

Parents meetings are organised regularly in order to share the progress of children and also inform them about different government schemes and programmes available for children and families.

Children's Development Khazana (CDK)

Conceptualized and initiated by Butterflies in 2001, as a vehicle to empower street and working children, Children's Development Khazana (CDK) is a life skills education programme, educating children and adolescents financial management & democratic values. Children of the age group of 9-18 years are the members of CDK which was initiated in six countries in Asia (Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Afghanistan, Nepal, Sri Lanka and India) and two countries in Africa (Ghana and Madagascar). In India it is operational in seven states and one Union Territory-Kerala, Bihar, Jharkhand, Odisha, Rajasthan, Maharashtra, Uttarakhand and Delhi.

Touching Lives

My CDK helped my family during the lockdown.

We learnt the importance of saving.

A 14-year-old boy, Abdul Nasir lives in one of the busy lanes near the historic monument Jama Masjid in North Delhi. Nasir hails from a small village in Bihar, an eastern state in India. His father used to work as a watchman at an ATM booth who lost his job during the first wave of the pandemic in the year 2020. Nasir lives in the motor market near Jama Masjid along with his father and a few friends (commonly known as Motor Market, it is one of the largest markets for motor equipment's in North Delhi).

After the first COVID-19 wave, sensing his father helplessness, Nasir chose to be an assistant in one of the motorbike repair shop and started helping out at the shop from December 2020. Barely three months after he started assisting at the repair shop, there was the second wave of COVID 19 and lockdown of Delhi was announced, leading to shutting down of shops. Within days, the pandemic was raging, and curfews shut the lives of daily wagers.

Intrigued by CDK Nasir joined Butterflies in 2016, and since then he has been an active member of Children's Development Khazana (CDK). CDK was the program that attracted him the most as he says, **"Whatever little money I earned could be kept safely after joining CDK"**. Before becoming a member of CDK, his money was either stolen or lost in the market where he used to sleep. Butterflies also helped him to develop an interest in education and got him enrolled in the government school nearby.

Nasir has been consistently making transactions with the limited money that he earned. Primarily he used his current account because he had to often withdraw his savings for his daily needs or to help his father. However, gradually after learning more about importance of savings, he also started saving. Though he did not have a regular and consistent income, he was able to save 800 INR in his saving account after the first wave of the pandemic hit the country. He realized that it was important to have a saving for emergencies and situations of uncertainties.

During the second wave of the pandemic Nasir and his father felt compelled to return to their village as lockdown was imposed and they realised it would be extremely difficult to survive in Delhi without an income. In the village, they got ration from the government shop but that seemed inadequate for a five-member family. Their dilapidated house a roof that required repair added to their woes.

Nasir witnessing his family struggles not only for food but also for a roof over their heads and acute economic distress; Nasir, thought about his CDK. Although he did not have too much of savings, he was eligible for an advance. He sent an application for welfare advance and the advance committee readily approved it, and Nasir got the advance.

Nasir said, **"I felt good that I helped ease my family's struggles through CDK Advance. I** borrowed Rs.1000, which was a lot of money at that point in time. Nobody wants to lend, as all are in fear that the money will not be returned, and moreover, no one in the village had money to spare, but I knew that my CDK will help me". When Nasir handed over the money to his father, His father hugged him, he became emotional, and his father's eyes welled up with tears. His father is normally not very demonstrative. Nasir mentioned to his father, **"Once we return to Delhi, I will save more in CDK. Budgeting and saving money is so important; one never knows when a crisis could happen suddenly."** His father promised to save part of his earnings, however, small it is as he realised the wisdom of his son Nasir.



Child Health and Sports Cooperative (CHSC)

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Child Health and Sports Cooperatives (CHSC) provides a safe environment for children to build life skills and make positive life choices. Using sports as an integral part of the cooperative, the project aims to overcome social isolation, improve social relationship, work in a team, follow rules, accept and acknowledge team mates irrespective of their ability, gender, be inclusive and prevent risk behaviour.

Amid the pandemic, CHSC proved to be extremely beneficial to children and parents despite disruptions even enrolling new members. Newer strategies were adopted using mobile phones to reach out to children. Health bulletins were developed and disseminated to families through phones with feedback and periodic health sessions were organised virtually. Children as members of CHSC demonstrated strong leadership and resilience in responding to the pandemic as they were already equipped with knowledge and skills such as hand hygiene, cough etiquettes and strategies to deal with anxieties and uncertainties. They helped their family members and community members with these and led collective actions on awareness activities (both offline and online) about Covid-19, importance of vaccinations, physical distancing, wearing masks and helped in distribution of relief materials.

Collective Actions

Children of Kashmere Gate, a contact point in North Delhi decided to make face masks on their own and also teach children. Few members mobilized pieces of cloth from tailor shops and purchased a few essentials like thread and scissors and hand stitched cloth face masks. The idea originated from the children whose families could not afford disposable masks every day.

Radio Programmes on All India Radio

Members of CHSC came together, brainstormed, developed, and recorded three radio programmes that were featured on All-India Radio - FM Rainbow. One was on CHSC itself, the second was one on Play and sports and the third one focused on Buddies and mental health. These episodes not only resulted in greater awareness among the listeners about Child Health and Sports Cooperatives, but also about the importance of sports and play and how to remain positive and emotionally well.

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Workshop on Nutrition and Kitchen Garden

The Government of India, National Family and Health Survey-5, Phase 2 finds that 51.6 per cent of women aged 15-19 years are anaemic. The percentage of younger children being anaemic is higher. In this context, Butterflies decided to initiate cooperative kitchen gardens, in the communities which would ensure families to include in their diets vegetables and greens that will improve their nutrition intake. A workshop on Nutrition and Kitchen Garden was organised and 26 adolescents participated, who will begin kitchen gardens in their communities.

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Touching Lives

The Little Doctor

Leading by example

Originally from Bihar, a state in eastern India, 14-year-old Rohit moved to Delhi with his family seven years ago in search of a better life and a decent source of income for the family. Since then, they have been staying in the congested streets of Chandni Chowk. Rohit's parents work part-time in a saree shop folding sarees (a traditional attire worn by women in India) and breaking walnuts at a dry fruits shop to provide for their four children. The present story sheds light on Rohit's role as a Child Health Educator (CHE) amidst the pandemic.

Background and Context

Rohit became part of the Butterflies programme in 2017 while he was studying in 5th Grade because he had heard that Butterflies contact points are study centers, to quote him "I joined Butterflies because my friends told me that the education provided here is good, there is no fee and you also go for exposure visits to various places such as museums, banks, hospitals, and parks to play" said Rohit. Later after joining, he found out about Child Health and Sports Cooperatives (CHSC). The program first caught his attention when he saw a Child Health Educator (CHE) providing first-aid to a child who had cut her finger. He wanted to become a CHE just after a few months of joining the health cooperative and stood for election but was not elected. He lost the election but never lost hope. Six months later when the next election was organized in September- October 2020, Rohit stood for election once again. This time CHSC members voted for Rohit and elected him as their new CHE. "I was so happy that day, I thought to myself, now I will be able to help people," shared Rohit.

But Rohit's happiness was short-lived, soon after he became the CHE, his parents decided to move to the village due to loss of employment. He felt sad because he could not take over the responsibilities as a CHE. Before leaving Delhi, he spoke to Child Rights Advocate (CRA is the social worker) and some of the CHSC members to inform about the same. The child Rights Advocate advised him to take the first-aid box along to help people in the village. He took the first aid box but was doubtful if it would be of any use and if anyone would come to him for first aid in the village.

In the village, initially, it felt good as he didn't have to study, he just played all day. Nobody stopped him. But as days passed, he began to miss his friends in Delhi, his other fellow-CHE Sakruddin, and his life as the new CHE at the contact point. The first-aid box that he brought kept lying in one corner of the room. Then one afternoon, his uncle came home panicking, his hand was covered in blood. He told Rohit's aunt that his hand got cut while cutting the grass with a sickle. Rohit immediately ran to his room to get the first-aid box. After a quick observation, Rohit told him that he can help while pointing to the box in his hand. Following this, a few days later Rohit's sister-in-law also cut her hand with the sickle. Now that she knew Rohit could help, she immediately came to Rohit, who bandaged her hand after disinfecting the wound. As the word spread villagers (adults as well as children) started coming to him. He dealt with all kinds of cases, the child who burnt his hand while bursting crackers, another who hurt his hand while playing with an axe. Cases where his intervention was enough, he would handle, but for others requiring intervention from a doctor, he would

refer them to the hospital. "People began to recognize and appreciate me, they said you are doing great work. It is a difficult time when people are scared to even step outside their homes, you are helping them with your skills learnt at your organisation Butterflies. At that moment, I really felt content as my dream of helping people had come true," shared Rohit in a delighted tone.

After returning to Delhi in January 2021, he continued with his work. He provided first-aid to their landlord for a few days, who had got himself hurt and was going to the hospital every day for dressing. "I told him you don't have to spend money every day for just the dressing, I will do it for you. The landlord smiled and thanked me for looking after him." In another instance, one of our CHSC members hurt himself while playing on the swing. Unfortunately, that day I wasn't carrying my first-aid box so I decided to take him to the nearby dispensary but that was closed so we took him to a private clinic nearby. The doctor gave him a tetanus injection and bandaged his forehead and charged Rs. 100. Between November 2020 and April 2021, Rohit provided first-aid in 80 cases and made referrals in 15 cases.

When asked what his next goal is, Rohit shared, "Abhi tak maine apne CHE ke role mein logon ke bahari ghav ko bhara hai, par ab main logon ke andruni ghav ko bhi bharna seekhna chahta hoon Buddy ban ke" (I have learned to provide first-aid for physical injuries next, I want to learn to provide first-aid for emotional injuries by becoming a Buddy).

Impact

When children like Rohit are given the opportunity to be trained and educated, they use their skills to support their peers and community. Even the pandemic was not able to dissuade him from fulfilling his responsibilities as a CHE.



Child Protection and Mental Health

Butterflies has been a strong advocator of preventing and protecting children from abuse, neglect and exploitation, as well as getting opportunities and support to enhance their mental health. Freedom from discrimination and violence is widely recognized as an important social determinant of mental health. Although protection issues and mental health concerns cut across all the sections of the society; children and adolescents from the marginalized and vulnerable groups face multiple forms of violence and deprivations, which hinder or minimize their opportunities to grow in a safe, supportive and protective environment. This gap raises the demand for facilitating and supporting children and adolescents to enhance their mental health and emotional wellbeing.

Butterflies works with the individual child as the primary focus, along with parents/family, community members, teachers/ school, and other stakeholders (decision-makers/ state) using different strategies, methods and tools.

The overall objective of the Child Protection and Mental Health (CPMH) program is to build the capacities of children, communities and schools, to create a supportive environment for the children to enhance their emotional well being and to prevent and respond to violence against children; provide therapeutic care to children with emotional and risk behaviour issues.

Year in Review

13 Child Social Protection Committees (CSPC) meetings covering topics & issues like - importance of Education, applying for a new ration card, Positive parenting, online classes and misuse of mobile phones, safety of children, COVID and precautionary measures, Right Dietary Pattern.

36 home visits have been conducted by the team in this period for the purpose of meeting the client and their family. The purpose was to interact and understand the family dynamics.

28 Life skill sessions were conducted on topics like - Importance of friendship, Team Building, Effective Communication, Time management, Building confidence, Adapting to stress & trauma, importance of mental health

32 case works were studied and intervened

Achievements of the CSPC

- The CSPCs have been actively engaged in the identifying and responding to the issues and challenges affecting the well-being of children in the neighborhood and communities. Their role was crucial during the pandemic and lockdown. Demonstrating a sense of responsibility, the Committee members took proactive initiatives to respond to the emergency situation and ensure the safety and wellbeing of children during this crisis. When the members were not able to meet physically due to restrictions, virtual meetings were organized to discuss the strategies to support children affected in their communities. They supported Butterflies in mobilizing children for online education classes and for food distribution during the lockdown where the frontline staff members of Butterflies could not go to the field. They also distributed education kits and recreation kits for the children in their communities.
- One CSPC member who is also a member of the Management Committee of a school in the neighborhood helped in getting admission of two children in school. She helped a husband and wife to open a bank account in a government bank in an emergency situation so that they could receive the government support directly transferred to the banks.



- CSPC members helped in coordinating and distributing the ration provided by Butterflies. They have also helped in coordinating and providing information about E ration provided by the government.
- A member of the Committee was asked by the school to speak to children to find out if they were facing challenges in
 accessing online classes and provide the information to the school so that necessary steps could be taken. During this
 process, she came to know that some of the children were not able to study online because there was only a single phone
 in the family and some families could not afford a smartphone. This information was helpful for schools to refine their
 learning strategies to reach out to all children in the community.
- CSPC members helped families who did not have food during the lockdown. They mobilized the community support for these families and collected food items from homes and provided it to them. They ensured that no one should remain hungry during a crisis situation.
- One CSPC member helped a group of adolescents in the Kashmiri Gate area find work in the market who had lost their jobs during the pandemic. Another CSPC member helped the community members to get the government distributed ration which was distributed a little far from the community. He ensured that they go to collect the material by wearing masks properly and maintaining social distancing.

Resilience Centre and CHILDLINE

CHILDLINE (1098) is a 24x7 emergency helpline service for children in crisis situation and in need of care and protection. Government of India, Ministry of Women and Child Development is implementing this helpline at districts and selected railway stations in partnership with non-government organizations to provide effective professional support to children in such emergency situation and also to safeguard them from harm and vulnerabilities. Any child or concerned adult can dial 1098 to access this service. The aim of this helpline is restoring children to their families and in the event the families cannot be traced the children linking children in need of care and protection, to relevant organizations run by the government and civil society organizations for long-term care, protection and rehabilitation.

Butterflies manage the helpline services of South and South-East District of Delhi and Nizamuddin Railway station. Any child or adult calling on behalf of a child is assured of assistance from a trained team capacitated to reach the child within an hour. The team works with multiple agencies and service provider such as the Police, Child Welfare Committee, District Child Protection Unit and non-governmental organizations working for the welfare and wellbeing of the children.

Being a child focused organization, Butterflies follows the intervention process which starts at the first call and continues till the child in need of care and protection is safely rehabilitated. After the intervention, to ensure the child's continued safety the Butterflies team does constant follow up with the child and his/her family.

DELHI CHILD RIGHTS CLUB

The 'Delhi Child Rights Club' was initiated by Butterflies on Human Rights Day 10 December 1998. Butterflies invited children associated with NGOs working with children in Delhi for becoming members of the club. With adult's failure to protect children's rights in Delhi, the children took it upon themselves to ensure action to promote and protect their rights. Children pledged to form a citywide "Delhi Child Rights Club" as one mechanism where-by they could work together towards creation of a child safe and friendly city. This Club enables children in Delhi to meet together to find ways to increase awareness and action about children's rights. Moreover, the Club seeks recognition as a forum of children who should be consulted whenever city policies or decisions are being made that affect them. DCRC has a core group, which has three child representatives from each DCRC member NGO. This core group meets once in a month to share their issues and plan their activities. Through discussions, workshops, drama, songs and games DCRC members share their experiences, plan and undertake actions (awareness campaigns, rallies and programmes) which promote their rights. DCRC members also conduct studies on issues concerning their lives and share it with decision makers and the media.

Year in Review

- Observing the 74th anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi's death, **68 children participated in an online Poetry and Drawing competition**.
- Letter to the Deputy Chief Minister- 166 DCRC members composed a letter to the Deputy Chief Minister of Delhi Mr. Manish Sisodia to share their concern about their transition from online classes to in-person instruction after a gap of 2 years. Their collective anxiety stemmed from the fact that most of them have been promoted to higher standards without sitting for examinations. The students requested help to bridge this preparation gap and offered an innovative action plan to prepare for the advanced syllabus.
- 5 issues of Delhi Children Times were brought out and circulated among the Alliance partners.

National Alliance of Grassroots NGOs

National Alliance of Grassroots NGOs (NAGN) is a network of grassroots organizations committed to the protection of children's rights. NAGN is based on a shared vision and common understanding on the issues concerning children to build solidarity for the cause of children and move forward unitedly to ensure effective action at the grassroots level for the protection of children's rights.

Year in Review

- 18 Alliance partners (5 DCRC & 13 NAGN) organised the Blue Umbrella Day on 16th April 2021. The Blue Umbrella Day campaign is a campaign to address the sexual violence against boys. It is organised by Family for Every Child (FFEC), UK, a global alliance of 41 local CSOs (including Butterflies) from 37 countries.
- 64 frontline staff from 27 organisations participated in an online training on "How to keep our mind healthy post the pandemic". The training was aimed at enhancing the knowledge and stress management skills of frontline practitioners to cope with their stress amidst pandemic, as well balancing their mental well-being and work efficiency.
- 94 children from 16 NAGN Partners and 14 DCRC Partners participated in an online training on journalism conducted by Mr. JB Oli, Head of Programmes at Butterflies
- 32 organisations participated in an online orientation on childrens media conducted by Mr. Sanjeev Kumar, Head-Childrens Media at Butterflies.

Alliance Partners Respond to COVID-19

Pratigya, Jharkhand

Frangya, Jharkhand In conjunction with District Administration, IIM Ranchi, and with generous financial contributions from ci-zens of Ranchi living in diaspora across the globe, Pratiya lnunched an Each One Feed One campaign duri the lockdown. Alter surveying the needs of the ultra poor living in the Indratagar, Jagannathpar, and Lain slums, Pratigya's coordinators, child leaders, and community volunteest (i=60 duly) have been able to he more than 2500 families, directing particular attention to populations with specific needs such as persons as fering from leprosy, the viscally limitative communities of Khoratha, Nagpari, Santhali artists, and senior ci zens. These targeted recipients receive a monthly allotment of dry rations.

Parigoa's outreach to one particular community of need is the result of information flu-the challenges faced by pregnant women due to lockdown at Hathiyagonda village. Butterflies School of Culinary and Catering

An eighteen months training programme in culinary and catering, by Butterflies School of Culinary and Catering (BSCC) has proved to be an effective professional course for urban poor young persons. Teenagers above the age of 17 years are imparted life skills to holistically enable these teenagers enter the hospitality sector as professionals, comparable to graduates from world-class institutes. BSCC focuses its training on imbibing students with entrepreneurial qualities so that they get good jobs in leading hotels or even start their own ventures. Our school has all the basic necessities for practical training, a coordinator, professional nutritionist, and a chef from registered hotel management institute, an assistant chef, a supervisor/instructor and one NIOS educator. Pusa Institute of Hotel management supports BSCC by giving opportunities to the trainees to be trained by their institute faculty--Chefs.



Touching lives

Nagina is a trainee from 2020-21 batch who has now been placed for internship at Hotel Pullman a five star hotel. During her six months internship, she will be placed in the kitchen and given different responsibilities in the food and beverages department. Nagina understands this opportunity and is working hard to learn maximum skills during this period. She has also been given an opportunity to test her skills in making sauces by the Chef in the kitchen.



Sachin

Sachin was 6 years old when he was separated from his family and placed in the Alipore government run child care institution. He does not remember how he was separated. He spent the next eleven years in the Child Care Institution. He was admitted in a school by the institution but Sachin says he could not do well academically because "there was no motivation and all children hardly bothered about studies". He could meet other children who became his friends. According to the officials of the institution, serious attempts were made to trace his family over the period of ten years without much success. When he turned 18 years old, in 2019, the CCI sought admission in Butterflies School of Culinary and Catering (BSCC). He trained for two years in Butterflies School of Culinary and Catering and while at BSCC, he was admitted to National Institute of Open Schooling to complete his high school too. Sachin is now working in a fine dining restaurant in Delhi and dreams to become a professional celebrity chef.



Children's Media

Butterflies children's media is an alternate media program to educate children with the new media technologies and as a life skill education to express themselves through different media platforms. This media program gives space to children to create their own media productions and share their views on issues that concern them. The children's media comprises of Butterflies Broadcasting Children, Children's Theatre and Delhi Children's Times Newspaper. The objective of the children's media program is to provide children with a platform of communication, to equip them with the practical knowledge and skills to articulate their own ideas and views to the general public, as a life skill education and path way to find their own field of interest.

Butterflies Broadcasting Children produce a radio programme "Bachon ki Nazar se (Through the eyes of Children) which is broadcast on All India Radio (Rainbow – 102.6MHZ) every Thursday at 3:45 pm. Children in Butterflies programme produce the programme and there are child correspondents from member organisations of National Alliance of Grassroots NGOs, who actively participate in the production of the radio programme.




Butterflies Society Income 2021-2022


Butterflies Society Expenditure 2021-2022
